The Welcome and Announcements

Call to Worship [Responsive]

One: The Peace of Christ be with you.

Many: And also with you.

One: As a deer longs for flowing streams, so longs my soul for You, O Beloved.

Many: My soul thirsts for the Beloved, for the Living Water.

One: My hope is in the Beloved, my strength and my joy,

Many: O my soul, open the door to Love!

One: O, send out your light and your truth;

Many: let them guide me,

One: Let them lead me to the inner home of integrity, your holy sanctuary within me!

Many: Then will I know You, Heart of my heart, my exceeding joy;

One: And I will praise You with song, O my Beloved, my Awakener..

Many: My hope is in the Beloved, my strength and my joy,

One: O my soul, open the door to Love!

Come, Thou Fount of every blessing, Tune my heart to sing Thy grace,

Streams of mercy, never ceasing, Call for songs of loudest praise,

Teach me some melodious sonnet, Sung by flaming tongues above,

One: Let us pray... Holy Watering One, Fount of Every Blessing, We come to you this morning, opening our parched places

Many: to receive the springs of living water You offer to us.

One: Most of the time, most of us don't even know we are thirsty.

Many: We don't know the deep dehydration that scours our bones and parches our hearts.

One: Sometimes, when our thirst pangs emerge, We draw from the enticing wells of the world's offering of power and profit,

Many: which leave us even more empty.

One: Still us, God, so we might listen to You

Many: speaking to us, knowing us, seeing us, loving us.

One: Fill us with your Living Water that will transform our spirits and souls into springs that burst forth

Many: with life and love for your people, for ourselves, and for our world. Amen.

We Listen for God's Word

The Prayer for Illumination [Responsive]

One: Let us pray... God, you reach into our lives not through instruction, but story.

Many: Open our hearts to be attentive: that seeing, we may perceive, and hearing, we may understand, and understanding, may act upon your word, that still lives and speaks to us. Amen.

The Scripture John 4:5-42 Readers Theatre

Narrator: So he came to a Samaritan city called Sychar, near the plot of ground that Jacob had given to his son Joseph. Jacob's well was there, and Jesus, tired out by his journey, was sitting by the well. It was about noon. A Samaritan woman came to draw water. His disciples had gone to the city to buy food, so Jesus said to her,

Jesus: 'Give me a drink.'

Narrator: The Samaritan woman said to him,

Samaritan Woman: 'How is it that you, a Jew, ask a drink of me, a woman of Samaria?'

Narrator: Jews do not share things in common with Samaritans. Jesus answered her,

Jesus: 'If you knew the gift of God, and who it is that is saying to you, "Give me a drink", you would have asked him, and he would have given you living water.'

Narrator: The woman said to him,

Samaritan Woman: 'Sir, you have no bucket, and the well is deep. Where do you get that living water? Are you greater than our ancestor Jacob, who gave us the well, and with his sons and his flocks drank from it?'

Narrator: Jesus said to her.

Jesus: 'Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, but those who drink of the water that I will give them will never be thirsty. The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life.'

Narrator: The woman said to him,

Samaritan Woman: 'Sir, give me this water, so that I may never be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water.'

Narrator: Jesus said to her,

Jesus: 'Go, call your husband, and come back.'

Narrator: The woman answered him,

Samaritan Woman: 'I have no husband.'

Narrator: Jesus said to her,

Jesus: 'You are right in saying, "I have no husband"; for you have had five husbands, and

the one you have now is not your husband. What you have said is true!'

Narrator: The woman said to him,

Samaritan Woman: 'Sir, I see that you are a prophet. Our ancestors worshipped on this mountain, but you say that the place where people must worship is in Jerusalem.'

Narrator: Jesus said to her,

Jesus: 'Woman, believe me, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. You worship what you do not know; we worship what we know, for salvation is from the Jews. But the hour is coming, and is now here, when the true worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for the Father seeks such as these to worship him. God is spirit, and those who worship him must worship in spirit and truth.'

Narrator: The woman said to him,

Samaritan Woman: 'I know that Messiah is coming. When he comes, he will proclaim all things to us.'

Narrator: Jesus said to her.

Jesus: 'I am he, the one who is speaking to you.'

Narrator: Just then his disciples came. They were astonished that he was speaking with a woman, but no one said, 'What do you want?' or, 'Why are you speaking with her?' Then the woman left her water-jar and went back to the city. She said to the people,

Samaritan Woman: 'Come and see a man who told me everything I have ever done! He cannot be the Messiah, can he?'

Narrator: They left the city and were on their way to him. Meanwhile the disciples were urging him,

Disciples: 'Rabbi, eat something.' **Narrator:** But he said to them.

Jesus: 'I have food to eat that you do not know about.'

Narrator: So the disciples said to one another,

Disciples: 'Surely no one has brought him something to eat?'

Narrator: Jesus said to them,

Jesus: 'My food is to do the will of him who sent me and to complete his work. Do you not say, "Four months more, then comes the harvest"? But I tell you, look around you, and see how the fields are ripe for harvesting. The reaper is already receiving wages and is gathering fruit for eternal life, so that sower and reaper may rejoice together. For here the saying holds true, "One sows and another reaps." I sent you to reap that for which you did not labor. Others have labored, and you have entered into their labor.'

Narrator: Many Samaritans from that city believed in him because of the woman's testimony, 'He told me everything I have ever done.' So when the Samaritans came to him, they asked him to stay with them; and he stayed there for two days. And many more believed because of his word. They said to the woman,

Samaritan Villagers: 'It is no longer because of what you said that we believe, for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is truly the Savior of the world.'

One: For the Word of God in Scripture, For the Word of God among us, For the Word of God within us.

Many: We give thanks to God!

One: God, Your grace reaches out to all of us. You call us to live as citizens of heaven, working together with one heart and mind. Strengthen us to live in a manner worthy of the Good News we have received, offering our lives in service of Your kingdom, where the last are first, and the first are last, and there is grace enough for all. Lord, in Your mercy,

Many: hear our prayer.

One: In the name of Jesus Christ, who taught his disciples to pray, saying...

ALL: Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy Kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory, forever. Amen.
